- Under the faculty development program it was decided to organized some workshops on new guidelines of NAAC which was very essential for the entire faculty member to know and understand new guidelines as per new matrix system. In view of this two faculty development program on following themes were planned and organized. Themes selected were:-
- An Insight into the fourth Cycle of NAAC: Revised Guidelines" The resource person for this workshop was Dr. Neehal Sheikh, Associate Professor in English, Santaji College, Nagpur on 11<sup>th</sup> April 2018. He explained in detail the first four criteria of NAAC and threw light on new guidelines and the matrix systems.
- > 2<sup>nd</sup> FDP was conducted on 17<sup>th</sup> April 2018. The resource person for this workshop was Dr. K.Panicker, Associate Professor, J. M. Patel College, Bhandara. He covered criteria V, VI and VII and emphasised on various innovative practices to be adopted to make the college distinct from others.

These two workshops provided the much needed guidance and impetus to all the faculty members. The feedback collected indicated the usefulness and need. Nineteen faculty members were registered for these two workshops and later given certificates at the end of workshops.

Under IQAC as management initiative to improve the overall governance and to know finer details about RTI act a workshop on "Right to Information Act" by Adv. Rajendra Pande, National Trainer RTI Act 2005 was organized on 7<sup>th</sup> April 2018. This workshop was organized in the college for Principal, Vice Principal, Supervisor, Head of the Department and office clerk from various institutes of Dharampeth Education Society, Nagpur. During the workshop Adv. Pande distributed a copy gazette of RTI Act 2005 to all participants and explained in detail about RTI Act. 35 faculty members registered and feedback forms were collected which express the overall satisfaction of workshop.

## 5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

All the departments of the college conduct class tests and surprise tests for constant evaluation of the students. Teaching-Learning strategies include use of different of teaching methods for a mixed ability class. Under the Mentor-Mentee scheme effective counselling of the students is done on various aspects that include academic, psychological and personal. The students meet their mentors whenever in need and get their guidance in the required subject of their concern. The teachers meet the parents either by contacting them or during parent teacher meet to upgrade the progression of their mentees.

The feedback from the mentees also help us to identify the weak and strong areas of the teaching – learning process that are then addressed and resolved. Apart from academics, various competitive exams are conducted and seminars on aptitude test and career counselling are arranged to as to prepare the students for future prospects.
