<p>On the Academic Side</p> <p>We are in the process of settling a well delineated paths for our Biology as well as Mathematics Group Students both offers them abound choice to hone their skills beyond the syllabi.</p> <p>We envision to send our students to offline sessions for advanced certifications to the esteemed institutions such as IIT Pavai, Horiba India Pvt. Ltd., VNIT, Nagpur and some of the prestigious institutions abroad in the near future.</p> <p>Institution holds a very positive approach towards integration of humanities and science with STEM. One of our finest initiatives in this regard is a specially designed certificate course entitled Excel for Banking and Accounts.</p> <p>We identified the need of skills inters required in the Banking and Accounts Sector and in CA offices. We invited top CA firm and top banking officials and faculty to design a special syllabus for Computer science students who will be able to handle excel with abundant dexterity to extract desired data required by the account's</p>					

officers. The courses offer a combination module from economics along with computer science. We envision that student going to the banking sectors will benefit out of these courses in several ways. We also envision that student from other institutions and outsiders will register for this unique course.

For our science undergraduate students' integration of humanities happens quite naturally through their involvement in NCC, NSS, College Rotaract Club, Women Cell etc.

Some of our students who express their interest in state and civil services are made members of the competitive examinations MPSC and UPSC groups. This groups meets ones every week on zoom to discuss topics from Political Science, Sociology, History, Economics, and Human Rights etc. with the help of NCERT Books.

One student gives presentation on the topic he has learnt from the NCERT book and the rest either add to the content presented from the different books they have read or discuss the issues arising out the presentations.

Students frame objective type questions and short and long answer questions based on the topic under discussion.

Each one is supposed to submit at least five questions with answers.

The institution offers limited flexibility in the curriculum by way of different combination of groups but through certifications we modify the curriculum quite effectively.

The curricula of some of the courses offered for our students under the Industry 4.0 approach is unique and highly specialized. For this we are in a process of signing an MOU with the V. R. Jamdar Siemens Center of Excellence, VNIT, Nagpur. There are only three VNITs in India that have this type of facility and we are happy that one of the highly ranked one in them is VNIT.

Bio Group Choices: CBZ, CBM and CZM

Certificate and Diploma Courses in addition to above combinations for the session are: Certificate Course in Bioinformatics and IIT Spoken Tutorial Courses, Vermi-composting and Vermi-culturing, fresh water fish culture, excel for banking and accounts, Diploma in Bioinformatics & Mushroom Cultivation,

Mathematics Group Choices are: PCM, PME, PSM, PCOM, SCOM, ECOM,

PSCOM

Certificate and Diploma Courses in addition to above combinations for the session are: Communication skills and personality development, developing computational skills using software packages and online google tools, Vedic Mathematics, Latex, IoT Devices, Excel for Banking and Accounts and Skill development in Competitive examinations.

On the sports and extracurricular side-

we envision our students and alumni to excel in sports and social service.

Archery - We have a very unique facility for the archers available on our campus. Nowhere else in the city there is a dedicated marked arena for archery. Our archers can practice throughout the day without obstructions.

This is one of the reasons that we have highly decorated archers in our teams.

Besides this we have allowed small children to train on our ground so that in a short time in future we will have all the school level champions in our teams. This small child archery club will be providing us well trained and groomed archers who can dream to be a part of the National team and win at international level.

We have developed a very special library on archery and we provide books to the archers and organize zoom sessions for reading the books.

Skating - We do not have a skating rink but we have groomed a roller skater Ku. Janhvi Kadu all these years. We are extremely happy to put on record that she is a promising champion of the sports and will produce the best for sure.

Janhvi's academics suffer because of competitions all over the nation but we have found her a student mentor who is her senior. Her faculty members also pay immense attention to her academics and support her. Her dietary needs are also taken care off well through support from the faculty as well as from the management.

All our certificate courses are credit based and approved by R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur, IIT Pawai and VNIT, Nagpur.

However, the degree syllabus is undergoing reforms and is going to be credit based as per the directions given to the Board of Studies of the R. T. M. Nagpur university Nagpur.

Our faculty members are part of the esteemed committee that is designing the syllabi along these lines.

Rigour of the courses is maintained through a well-developed plan. The certificate courses are designed as per the current needs by the experts and submitted to the university. University further appoints committees of experts to ensure the worthiness of the certificate courses. Upon approvals the courses are started and outcome of the courses is evaluated based on what skills have been acquired by the students. One concrete example is that of Online Jewellery Design course framed and conducted by one of the subject experts. The best part of it has been students sold their jewelry on Instagram and exhibitions.

Students are getting internships and job offers because of the skills they have shown.

In the Vidarbha region one of the major issues linked with several other issues is productivity or fertility of the agricultural land. We conduct composting project to understand the processes that might bring healthy changes in the quality of soil.

We involve our students in the vermi composting projects and have invitees from the esteemed BARC as mentor for the group. BARC scientist Shri. Maitre mentors our students. Faculty from physics and electronics departments also associate themselves with the composting project and try to make constructive contributions.

The institution has already begun to elevate itself according to the multidisciplinary and inter-disciplinary approach in view of NEP 2020.

We are very shortly submitting a PG Diploma Certificate in Sports Nutrition to the R. T M Nagpur University Nagpur.

Our Certificate Course titled Excel for Banking and Accounts represents our efforts to have a multidisciplinary approach.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

We envision that our BSc students certainly will have an additional statement of skill sets because of the credit-based certificate and

diploma courses they are doing in addition to the statement of marks sheet they get for the completion of university degree. The ABC framework is going to be provided by the parent university and is under review.

In view of NEP the Industry 4.0 approach we have taken will produce highly employable and skilled students.

1. We redesigned our certificate courses as per the requirements of ABC. The regular syllabus is being fine-tuned by the university.
2. The orientation course was conducted to register the UG and PG students for DigiLocker and ABC ID as per affiliating university directives.

17.Skill development:

The institution focuses on giving opportunity to students to improve their soft skills, Skills of Mathematics and other subjects required for competitive examination. We conduct special sessions for subjects like constitution, political science, thinkers and theories for the aspirants of MPSC and UPSE examinations.

We also pay attention to entrepreneurship development skills of students and it is matter of pride for us that our students developed OTP platform-based software for assignment submission and internal assessment during the menacing covid times and we did not hesitate to purchase special web space for motivating these students.

We also have MOU with V. R. Jamdar Siemens Center of Excellence to hone students' employability skills further under the INDUSTRY 4.0 initiative. Our students will be absolutely industry ready and even in a position to establish startup companies.

We are also motivating students to join Infosys spring board project offering a large number of online courses.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Our B. Sc Programme does have three Indian Languages as options at the entry level. They can select one language out of Hindi, Marathi and Sanskrit.

Besides we do celebrate Matrubhasha Din, Sanskrit Din and Hindi Diwas also so that students stay connected with Indian languages and

pick right values easily.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

We are focused on outcome-based education and we design activities and sign MOUs and Tie-ups in such a way as to produce desired outcome as per the vision and mission of the Institution.

We offer different teaching learning processes so that our students get opportunity to become researchers, sensitive citizens, environmentally aware, capable of getting employed in the digital transformation industry under Industry 4.0 initiative.

Curriculum is mapped with the outcome and every unit we cover in classroom of every subject is linked with activities for students.

20.Distance education/online education:

We have used distance and online education as a blessing to complement and strengthen our curriculum quite seriously and today we have a very good number of online courses. This in fact is one of the strengths of our institution. During the menacing covid times we conducted an online course of Jewelry Designing Course entirely on the online platform and students reported us that their Jewelry got sold through Instagram and Amazon portals.

We very successfully switched our certificate courses and classes on the online platform in little time.

We are running online courses from IIT Bombay, Spoken Tutorials, Infosys and R.T.M.Nagpur University, Nagpur

We have a regular distance education of Yashvantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University centre and we offer undergraduate as well as post graduate courses through it.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

We ensure effectiveness in delivery of the curriculum through different modes. Annual plans are made in advance at the beginning of the academic session. Most of the faculties are members of BOS. The curriculum delivery is stimulated through the mechanism of well qualified teachers. Timetable, teaching plan, course completion certificate and feed-back system. The various college committees play their role effectively to generate synchronized planning process. Academic experts guide new entrants regarding their batches, timetables, syllabi and curriculum. We accommodate students' choices for the certificate courses as much as possible.

The effectiveness of the curriculum enhanced by successful integration of ICT in the teaching learning methodologies. The efforts of the institution have been much appreciated by IIT Spoken Tutorial National Coordinator. The institution runs 19 certificate courses specially designed as per the needs of the students and are approved from the University Authorities. Our

courses are also mapped with syllabi and are started within one month from the date of approval from the university. Credit based grades are given to the students and the process is documented at every stage.

It is a matter of institutional achievement that 04 skill-based courses modified the syllabi this year.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Continuous Internal Evaluation is made by each department based on the students' involvement and performance in the activities such as class tests/unit tests, home assignment, attendance, seminars, quizzes, attentiveness and involvement in various academic as well as socially oriented activities.

The institutional calendar for the certificate courses, remedial classes and bridge courses is scheduled and adjusted with the primary university calendar.

We plan quizzes, bridge courses and aptitude tests at the beginning of the session to get some understanding of the students. Students are given clear ideas about the method used for internal assessments.

As compared to earlier sessions about half of the session was conducted offline with relaxed restrictions and adhering to academic calendar became less challengeable. However, in view of students' unavoidable difficulties and the menacing times flexibility was allowed to the students within the preview of laws and restriction.

At the initial stage the college could not give filed based assignments to the students because of restrictions.

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

We support our traditional classroom teaching method with student centric activities and assignments. We have a number of facilities such as Botanical Garden, Museums, Vermicomposting Project and Fisheries Project to cater to the needs of experiential learning.

- The institute has containers for solid waste collection which is properly disposed-off as per the rules of Nagpur Corporation.
- Physics Department solicits domestic electronic garbage from interested parties, including obsolete mobile phone chargers and other similar devices in order to reuse them. We have outdated computers, instruments, and other equipment that we donate to a recycling company since they can no longer be serviced. They offer carbon footprint certification. The Department is also collecting plastic garbage such as cans, bottles, and food container containers and reusing them, with a minimal amount of labor and materials, to plant indoor/domestic plants. The participants were then given the planters to utilize. Special workshops are organized to fix damaged experiment kits involving students, and the same are utilized to design new laboratory equipment. Students from the last year participate in the activity in order to enhance their skills and become independent.

Because we believe in detecting them early in this drive, we typically administer these tests to premarital state persons, adolescents, and children.

The college has chosen to make vermi-composting a top priority and thrust area because it is in the Vidarbha Region, which is plagued by disaster and difficulty for farmers. Various opportunities for engagement can be seen in this challenge. The vermi-composting initiative is utilized in a variety of ways, including:

- Direct experience teaching and learning opportunities for students making manure out of campus green waste.
- Students get the chance to take part in a research project and also publish their findings in journals.
- To encourage creativity and the development of new ideas, we've established a special Vermi-compost mentorship group. Dr. Maitre, a prominent BARC scientist, is the mentor for our project, which makes use of a BARC-developed carbon measurement tool.
- To expose our pupils to the realities of rural living, we encourage the vermi-compost group students to participate in specially organized camps in rural regions.
- The institution is going to be ready with the INDUSTRY 4.0 approach. We are going to establish a tie-up with Vishram Jamdar Siemens Center of Excellence, VNIT, Nagpur. VNIT students are getting training in 6 highly advanced integrated courses such as IOT and Reverse Engineering.

We ensure effectiveness in delivery of the curriculum through different modes. Annual plans are made in advance at the beginning of the academic session. Most of the faculties are members of BOS. The curriculum delivery is stimulated through the mechanism of well qualified teachers. Timetable, teaching plan, course completion certificate and feed-back system. Assignments:

Faculty evaluates assignments based on the rubric which is also shared with the students well in advance. The evaluated assignments are given back to students thus maintaining the transparency of the marks assigned and to resolve grievances if any.

- The institute has containers for solid waste collection which is properly disposed-off as per the rules of Nagpur Corporation.
- Physics Department solicits domestic electronic garbage from interested parties, including obsolete mobile phone chargers and other similar devices in order to reuse them. We have outdated computers, instruments, and other equipment that we donate to a recycling company since they can no longer be serviced. They offer carbon footprint certification. The Department is also collecting plastic garbage such as cans, bottles, and food container containers and reusing them, with a minimal amount of labor and materials, to plant indoor/domestic plants. The participants were then given the planters to utilize. Special workshops are organized to fix damaged experiment kits involving students, and the same are utilized to design new laboratory equipment. Students from the last year participate in the activity in order to enhance their skills and become independent.
- The domestic garbage, including food scraps and plant debris, is composted by worms in vermicomposting pits or tanks for biodegradation.
- Chemical waste is diluted before being sent to the drainage system, and bio-medical waste is disposed of with care. We have MoU for proposal disposal of bio waste.
